As we know statistics can be interpreted in many ways but, as a general rule, it is safe to say people in living in the East Riding are less likely to be the victim of crime than people living in other areas served by Humberside Police. The headlines will say that overall crime in your area is rising, with a projected increase this year when compared to last. It is important to put the data in context and point out that the primary reason for the overall increase is the rise in offences under the category 'Violence against the person'. This is due to the increase in stalking and harassment offences that we now record under National Crime Recording Standards (NCRS). Many of these offences are committed online, involving people who already know each other, and previously would have been dealt with without the need to record a criminal offence.

We also now have Local Intelligence Officers back in the community, they are working hard to identify those responsible for burglaries and thefts of motor-vehicles in the area.

2. Crime issues of particular note

The following list shows some of the crimes that have occurred in the previous month in your area.

- Two secure vehicles parked in the rugby club car park were broken into and items including a wallet and mobile phone were stolen.
- A secure property in Barmby Moor was broken into, searched and items stolen.
- An object was thrown at a window of a property in Pocklington causing damage to it.



3. Community Priorities

a. Pocklington Town Centre area (Evenings):

Throughout November we are to continue our high visibility patrols of the Pocklington Town Centre area to deter potential anti-social behaviour. These patrols include regular checks on peripheral areas at Pocklington Infants' School, Maxwell Road (periodic reports of criminal damage and youths causing annoyance), All Saints Church (periodic reports of anti-social behaviour on an evening), the Tennis Club (reports of anti-social behaviour, (ASB)) and town car parks (reports of low level anti-social behaviour). Criminal offenders will be challenged robustly, arrested or reported for summons. Penalty Notices for Disorder or warning letters may be used in appropriate cases however, those who offend should expect to be arrested and dealt with if their anti social behaviour amounts to criminal offending. The exercise of discretion should not be expected.

b. Pocklington - Vehicle related nuisance

To reduce anti-social behaviour (ASB) and its impact on the communities within the Pocklington area as well as taking positive action against offenders who cause ASB with their vehicles. Hotspot areas in Pocklington will be checked regularly and any drivers using their cars to cause alarm or distress will be considered for warnings and possible seizure of their vehicles under Section 59 of the Police Reform Act.

4. Crime Reduction Advice

GOING SHOPPING? GOING OUT?

Don't give opportunist thieves the chance to bag your belongings. It doesn't matter if you are out shopping or going out for a social event, always make sure you stay alert at all times. By taking some simple steps you can help protect yourself and your belongings:

DON'T LEAVE YOUR HANDBAG UNATTENDED in shopping baskets, trolleys, pushchairs or mobility scooters. In cafes and restaurants keep your bags on your lap, between your feet or place the strap around a chair leg. (Don't hang your bag on the back of your chair where you can't keep an eye on it.)

KEEP YOUR HANDBAG CLOSE TO YOU and closed at all times. Choose a bag that can be zipped up or closed and get into the habit of checking that its fully fastened up after each time you have needed to get something out of it. Ideally your purse and phone should be well hidden and tucked away out of sight and out of easy reach of pickpockets.

Be particularly careful on public transport, keep your bag where you can see it. If you carry a rucksack, wear it on your front rather than on your back or over your shoulder.

DON'T LEAVE YOUR MOBILE PHONE ON THE TABLE. Mobile phones are frequently targeted by thieves and can easily be swiped when your back is turned even just for a minute.

KEEP THE AMOUNT OF VALUABLES INSIDE HANDBAGS TO AN ABSOLUTE MINIMUM and try not to carry large amounts of cash around with you.

BE MINDFUL OF DISTRACTIONS. Thieves working in pairs may try to divert your attention in order to steal your handbag or pick pocket your purse or phone from within. Avoid carrying too much around with you, the more bags you've got the more vulnerable you are. If you need to take shopping back to your car, put your bags in the car boot – don't leave them where they can be seen eg in a footwell or on a back seat.

Anti-social behaviour comes under three section when reporting to the police –

<u>ASB Personal</u> – Deliberately targeted at an individual or group or having an impact on an individual or group rather than the community at large.

<u>ASB Nuisance</u> – Engaging in or threatening to engage in conduct causing or likely to cause a nuisance or annoyance to persons engaged in lawful activities.

<u>ASB Environmental</u> – Incidents where individuals and groups have an impact on their surroundings including natural, built and social environments
